# Alcohol Use Identification Test (AUDIT-C)

The AUDIT-C is scored on a scale of 0-12 (scores of 0 reflect no alcohol use). In men, a score of 4 or more is considered positive; in women, a score of 3 or more is considered positive. Generally, the higher the AUDIT-C score, the more likely it is that the patient's drinking is affecting his/her health and safety

### Advice

If a clinician suspects that the patient is minimizing his or her alcohol use, or if a patient's score is near the cutoff, one may consider utilizing a more lengthy screening test to better determine the nature and extent of the problem.

Other validated tests for further assessment include:

- Michigan Alcoholism Screening Test (MAST)
- Alcohol Use Disorders Identification Test (AUDIT)

## Management

- When screening results are positive, the patient should be referred for further evaluation and treatment of an alcohol use problem.
- This will vary based on available resources but is ideally to an addiction psychiatrist, psychologist, or addiction treatment program.

#### **Critical Actions**

In any hospital setting where access to alcohol may be limited, always monitor for signs/symptoms of alcohol withdrawal, even in patients who have not screened positive for an alcohol problem.
